1911 Census Street Indexes

Street indexes are a very useful tool, especially when you are trying to find people in cities. [Here is a link to the website of the National Records of Scotland](#) who have PDF indexes available for free.

The '[Parishes and Registration Districts of Scotland by name](#)' guide (1.4 MB pdf) lists all parishes and districts in alphabetical order with the dates during which each was operative. There are also pages with further breakdowns of the cities of Aberdeen, Dundee, Edinburgh and Glasgow.

OPR Coverage

Sadly, not all records of birth, marriages and death survive before 1855. It can be useful to know where the gaps are. The '[List of Old Parish Registers](#)' is invaluable in this regard.

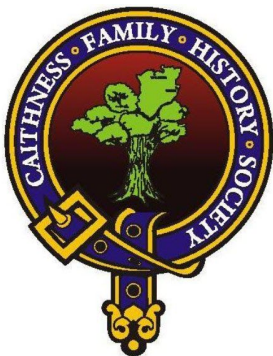

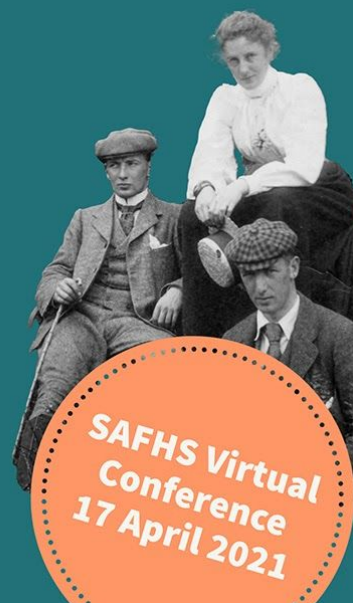

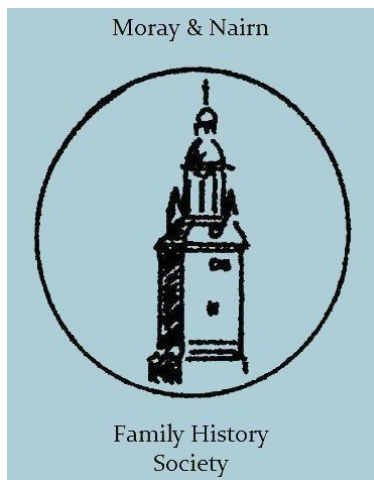

Central Scotland Family History Society

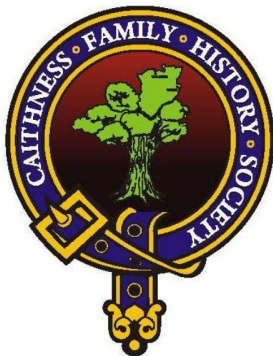
